STUDENT LEADERS



STUDENT INITIATIVE

Last Friday, we welcomed Maddy from STOMP! The program was selected to complement our Arts program. Each class participated in a dance workshop with Maddy before confidently performing their choreography at our Assembly in the afternoon.

ECOLINC INCURSION

This week, our Prep to Year 3 students participated in an incursion with Ecolinc. The students explore the different parts of a frog's body and built their understanding of a variety of adaptations that help frogs survive in their environment.

The sessions also explored the life cycle of a frog and how we can help frogs in the local area.

Our Prep students have recalled some information from their session:

- The Mum holds the babies and the Dad does the signal. (Harlow)
- One frog was black and yellow and it didn't blend into the green. (Aria)
- The black and yellow frog is poisonous. (Lucas)
- When frogs go to sleep their eyes are a tiny bit gold. (Jannali)
- When frogs are awake their eyes are black. (Maverick)
- Frogs jump. (Rylan)
- Tadpoles turn into frogs. (Ashton)
- Frogs drink water through their skin. (Jannali)
- Frogs breathe through their skin. (Willow)

- When frogs are tadpoles they have a little tail at the back. When they grow bigger they don't have a tail anymore. (Piper)
- Frogs stick their tongues out to eat. (Ashton)
- Frogs hop really far. (Aria)
- Frogs don't chew their food, they just swallow it. (Aria)
- Frog tongues are a little bit liquidish. (Beatrice)
- When frogs swallow their food they close their eyes. (Maverick)
- Frogs swallow their food alive. (Harlow)
- Frogs swim in water. (Maya)

UNIFORM DONATIONS

If you have any uniform items that no longer fit your child/ren, we would gratefully accept any donations for the sick bay. We are particularly after tracksuit pants and shorts.



CAMPS, SPORTS AND EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors. Excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works while sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are a part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. The allowance (\$125 for Primary school students) is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

- To be eligible for the fund you must:
- on the first day of Term one, or;
- on the first day of Term two;

• a) Hold a Veterans Affairs Gold Card, Centrelink Health Care Card (HCC), Pensioner Concession Card (PCC), OR

- b) Be a temporary foster parent, and
- c) Submit an application to the school by the due date.

Parents who receive a Carer Allowance on behalf of a child, or any other benefit or allowance not income tested by Centrelink, are not eligible for the CSEF unless they also comply with one of (a) or (b) above.

If you applied for CSEF at Lethbridge Primary School last year, you do not need to complete an application for this year, unless there has been a change of family circumstances. You only need to complete an application form if any of the following has occurred:

- new student enrolments; your child has started at Lethbridge Primary School in 2023.
- changed family circumstances; such as a change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing this year (eg prep students)

NAMING UNIFORM ITEMS

A reminder to please label your child's belongings with their name. We have a range of lost property in the office that has remained unclaimed as it isn't labelled.

CONVEYANCE ALLOWANCE

The conveyance allowance is a contribution towards transport costs and is not intended to cover the full cost of transporting children to and from school.

Eligibility

An application on behalf of a student may be submitted if the student is:

- a Victorian resident;
- school aged and enrolled (3) three or more days per week at a school; and
- attending a school/campus located outside the Melbourne metropolitan conveyance boundary

A student who meets the above requirements may be eligible if they:

- attend their nearest or designated neighbourhood government school/campus appropriate to their year level, at which admission is permissible, and
- reside 4.8km or more by the shortest practicable route from the campus attended
